The poet Charles Bukowski once wrote: "An intellectual says a simple thing in a hard way. An artist says a hard thing in a simple way." For me, he gives a great example of this truth in his poem "empties." This autobiographical poem shows us a snapshot of addiction as it follows he and his girlfriend one night as they dispose of the mountain of empty wine bottles they had accumulated in their apartment.

"We were afraid the landlord would be tipped off by his trash cans, that he'd realize there were two serious drunks among his tenants... finally upon a given night after drinking for a few hours we'd sneak the bags and boxes down the back stairway and into our old car... driving slowly up into the Baldwin Hills we were terrified that the police might stop us and insist that we spend at least

a couple of days in jail... then as if the very searchlight of God was focused on me I'd leap out and begin throwing sacks and boxes of empties into the throbbing dark... she'd hand me a fresh hit and I'd pass it back and she'd say, "geez, don't you feel better?" and I'd answer, "yeah, how much we got left?"... it was a hollow, temporary victory that only someone like us could appreciate."

I have always been struck by the picture that this poem paints, and how very much it says so simply. It is just a description of a man hurling bottles from a cliff, but it begs the question of what emptiness truly is. If artistry is saying something hard simply, he is certainly doing that. Bukowski's poems have helped me on my spiritual journey by warning me where not to step, though I have not always listened.

A simple poem conveying so much makes me think of another quote. This one is by Fred Rogers aka Mr. Rogers: "Life is deep and simple and what our society gives us is shallow and complicated." If I had Mr. Rogers in my office this morning, I would ask him what a deep simple life looks like, but maybe he has already shown me. For him it looked like helping generations of children deal with their feelings and feel connected. That is both not complicated and one of the most meaningful things I can imagine. If there is an art to living maybe Fred was a master of it.

On the last Wednesday of April, I was leading a bible study as is my habit, going verse by verse and trying to comment as best I could on what the scripture has to say. On this particular morning though we ran across the fourth chapter of 1 John. "Everyone who loves is born of God and knows God...Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another...God is love." I teach primarily off the cuff, but after reading those verses aloud I was rather flummoxed about how I might complicate them with commentary. What else can you really say other than what John says in those verses about who God is and what we are supposed to be doing? How many shallow and complicated arguments do those few verses render pointless? Since we believe that God is the ultimate author of Scripture, I suppose I should not be surprised that 1 John meets Bukowski's criteria of artistry by speaking of a hard thing simply, but sinner that I am I was surprised anyway. God is an artist. God is deep and simple. God is love. I'll keep trying to complicate it for the sake of job security, but I'm also thankful that God has said it all. *Pastor Phil*

Outreach Program of the Month

Save Your Bottle Caps for Benches

Our Outreach Ministry of the Month is the **Kiwanis Bench Project**, which converts our bottle caps into **Buddy Benches** for schools, libraries, community organizations, and Habitat communities. Why is it called a Buddy Bench? It was originally designed so that kids who may be shy, new, or just having a bad day could sit there; a classmate or teacher who noticed a child sitting on the bench would know that they needed a buddy. Today it fills that need as well as fostering relationships for all ages.

Kevin Meyer from Community Church started the Tellico Village bench program five years ago, and Shepherd of the Lake has been one of its supporters from the start. Early on, the Kiwanis Club joined the endeavor as a co-sponsor. From five benches the first year, the program has grown, and this year dedicated its **50**th bench! It takes 200 pounds of caps to make one bench. Here's how you can help:

<u>Collect plastic bottle caps</u>. In Friendship Hall there is a bin near the exit door where you can deposit your caps. Barb Warfel, who is our liaison, empties the bin periodically and delivers the caps to Kevin. Many types of clean plastic bottle caps up to 8" and recycle #2, #4 or #5 are acceptable. 

Water To Thrive

Twelfth Well

In February, 2022 our congregation funded our twelfth well. This well was part of a group of 45 projects that were being implemented by W2T's partner known as Mekane Yesus in the district of Burra in Ethiopia.

This group of wells took a little longer to complete, partly because there were 45 well projects and completion reports are not received until all of the wells are fully operational.

I am happy to report that our twelfth well is serving a minimum of 420 members of the Betena village. That is just the minimum number of lives that have been changed by receiving clean water, it is more likely to be 2 to 3 times that amount.

Before a well is placed in a community, they have to establish a water committee that must have women on it because it is the women and girls who are most responsible for gathering water. After the water committee is established, they receive training on water, sanitation and hygiene practices. They also must open a maintenance fund bank account for the well.

With each well, lives are changed forever!! The girls can attend school instead of spending much of their days walking to fetch filthy water that has water borne diseases in it. Women now have time to grow crops

and participate in other ways to provide income to the family. The community will have much better health and the children won't die from drinking the water. What we take for granted, is a life changing event for the villages that receive a well.

The Foundation of Stewardship

The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it; the world, and those who live in it. **Psalm 24:1**

The Bible consistently gives us a countercultural and counterintuitive understanding of the world and ourselves. It's so radical that many of us can't accept it.

The idea is that the world belongs to God, and so does everything *IN* the world. Even *US!* We ,who proudly think of ourselves as autonomous, self-directed and self-made, actually belong to God. In other words, we don't own ourselves. We are possessions of the Almighty.



Think about that for just a minute. We don't own the earth, our houses, our cars, our possessions, our animals, our children, or even ourselves. It all belongs to God. We belong to God. Though made in God's image, we are nonetheless humble servants – slaves, actually.

The reality that God owns everything, even us, forms the foundation for biblical stewardship. If God owns everything, including us, then we are responsible to God for our wisest and best use of the planet, our possessions, our talents and our lives.

Voting location to change in Tellico Village



The Loudon County Election Commission decided Thursday, April 18, to move a voting location for future elections in Tellico Village.

Voters formerly cast ballots at the Chota Recreation Center on Awohili Drive will now do so less than a mile away at Shepherd of the Lake Lutheran Church, 143 Chota Center. Those residents who formerly voted at Chota will receive new cards and a letter about the change in the mail in the next few weeks. The move is being made because the church is a more central location with better parking, according to Susan Harrison, county administrator of elections.

"The church was very gracious in letting us come there," Harrison shared.

Another reason for the change is that during polling hours, the recreation center would close to the public for its usual purposes. Now pickleball won't have to be interrupted so people can cast ballots.

Signage denoting the change will be up during the next election in August, but the locations are close enough in proximity that if someone does go to the old election location, they can be at the right place within minutes.

SALES TAX VOTE CERTIFIED

Another point of business during Thursday's meeting was to certify the results of the April 13 special election in Lenoir City.

The certification cemented Lenoir City voters' rejection of a local sales tax increase that was earmarked for city schools' expansions and a city community and senior citizens center. If voters had approved the referendum, the local sales tax rate would've risen from 2 percent to 2.75 percent.

Harrison read the results to the Election Commission members before they were approved.

"(The results were) 236 for, 496 against for a total of 732," Harrison said. "Actually we had 734 voters ... Two voters decided to cast a blank ballot."

Voter turnout for the special election was about 12 percent. Thirty-nine residents voted absentee, and 454 voted early.

This was Lenoir City government's second attempt in six years to increase the local sales tax. In November 2018, a proposition for a half-cent increase to the sales tax to go toward school safety improvements failed 1,372 to 964.

The latest chapter of the saga was recognizable by the dueling signs that popped up around the city.

Signs urging people to vote "no" on the referendum were paid for by Loudon County Commissioner Van Shaver, and the ones imploring people to vote "yes" were paid for privately through donations by School Board members.

Following the election, Lenoir City Mayor Tony Aikens said the outcome means the senior citizens center is off the table. A local sales tax hike being on the ballot again in the future isn't something he currently sees as being an option, but that determination is ultimately up to City Council.

Jeanne Barker, director of Lenoir City Schools, said the Board of Education would be working to determine next steps for accommodating a growing student population.
